The 2017 drama and family film *Wonder* is based on a 2012 novel by the same name written by R. J. Palacio. *Wonder* is directed and written by the American novelist and film director Stephen Chboksy. It is a film full of very exceptional actors, including Jacob Tremblay, Izabela Vidovic, Owen Wilson and Julia Roberts. I found this film to be truly inspiring and highly uplifting, especially thanks to the convincing actors and an amazing director.
